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Ban on single-use vapes starts in Jan

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Queensland introduces Australian-first law to allow midwives and nurses to prescribe abortion pills

Queensland will become Australia's first jurisdiction to introduce a law to allow nurses and midwives to dispense pregnancy termination medication in a move expected to improve access in the state's "huge abortion deserts". In August the Therapeutic Goods Administration scrapped restrictions on the prescription of medical abortion pills, known as MS-2 Step, to be used in the early stages of pregnancy.
