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Government refuses private health industry request for 6 per cent rise

in premiums

In good news for consumers, the federal government has refused a private health insurance industry request for the biggest average increase in premiums in the past six years. The government and the industry negotiate each year on premium increases, but this year their request for an average 6 per cent rise was rejected, with health minister Mark Butler citing cost-of-living pressures.

Health Minister Mark Butler has rejected the health insurance industry's request to increase premiums between 4% and 6%, the highest increase since 2018. It's part of the annual negotiations for premium increases, which the minister must approve for each provider. An increase would have hit the 14.6 million Australians, or 55% of the population who have hospital or extra cover.

Grant reports Health Minister Mark Butler has rejected the health insurance industry's request to deliver the biggest premium rise in at least six years as the government tries to quell voter discontent over the rapid increase in the cost of living. He adds as part of the annual negotiations for premium increases, which Butler must approve for them to be agreed to, the country's 31 insurers have requested annual rises that could have delivered an average premium hike as high as 6%. Grant notes Butler said he was not inclined to approve providers' proposed premium increases, based on the information currently provided.
