'No delay' on vax for shingles

The federal government has denied claims of delays in its \$800m free shingles vaccine rollout, despite some GPs alerting to a lack of supply. Federal Health Minister Mark Butler said almost half a million vaccines have been delivered since October, two months after the government announced that five million Australians would be able to access a free dose starting November 1.

Be safe, not sorry this festive period

NSW Health has shared some timely advice regarding storing and eating food over the festive period. In a nutshell, eating cooked food beyond its use-by date can lead to food poisoning. You should keep refrigerated leftovers for no more than three days. To keep your leftovers safe, remember to put any food that needs to be kept cold in the fridge straight away; keep your fridge temperature below 5 degrees; reheat foods to at least 60 degrees Celsius, until they're steaming hot; and avoid eating food that's meant to be in the fridge if it's been left out for more than four hours.
