- <u>The Herald Sun</u> (page 1) reports that new research commissioned by the Nursing and Midwifery Board of Australia has said the nation's midwife workforce is in "crisis" after the regulator revealed there were insufficient numbers to meet future demand, as federal Assistant Health Minister Ged Kearney saying the recommendations would be the "first step" to ensuring the service is available to all Australian mothers.
- The Courier Mail (page 1) reports that the Katter's Australian Party has said it would not look to repeal the 2018 decriminalisation of abortion in Queensland's next parliament, with the party saying it will focus on a Bill forcing clinicians to care for babies born alive resulting from a failed termination of pregnancy.
- The Courier Mail (page 1) reports that Commonwealth Games Australia (CGA) president Ben Houston has expressed his appreciation for Scotland's decision to host the 2026 Commonwealth Games, saying that it has "delivered the perfect blueprint for ongoing success and development".
- The Sydney Morning Herald (page 3) reports that a new study by KPMG has found up to 30 per cent of diseases could be safely treated in virtual or home hospitals, saving the healthcare system billions of dollars, with federal Health Minister Mark Butler saying he would examine the My Home Hospital model to see how it could be adopted more broadly.

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# Police arrest alleged leader of \$30m crime syndicate but warn tobacco wars are here to stay

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## Tests link 'forever chemical' to 1992 petrol tanker crash
