- <u>The Canberra Times</u> (page 1) reports that Independent ACT Senator David Pocock has expressed his disappointment over the federal government's delay in delivering a national Centre for Disease Control following the retirement of chief medical officer Paul Kelly, while Health Minister Mark Butler said, the interim CDC was "already significantly strengthening Australia's preparedness for future pandemics".
- <u>The Age</u> (page 1) reports that new figures from Women's Health Victoria has revealed twothirds of local government areas in the state have no surgical abortion facilities, with WHV chief executive Sally Hasler saying she would like to see abortion "integrated into the health system as a part of standard maternity care service".
- <u>The Age</u> (page 1) reports that new data from the 44,000 WorkCover claims lodged by emergency workers across Victoria has revealed a 50 per cent increase in mental injury claims caused from the Black Saturday and Black Summer extreme bushfire periods compared to other periods since 2005.
- <u>The Guardian</u> reports that Nationals senator Jacinta Nampijinpa Price has been criticised by Coalition frontbenchers Sussan Ley, Jane Hume and Bridget McKenzie, for politicising women's reproductive rights, while federal Health Minister, Mark Butler, said the issue was a state responsibility.
