- <u>The Herald Sun</u> (page 1) reports a new cardiac arrest treatment known as E-CPR that utilises an ECMO life support machine while CPR is underway has been used to save the life of 50 per cent of patients at Austin Health, according to the head of Austin's ECMO program.
- <u>The Sydney Morning Herald</u> (page 3) reports NSW will launch an education program urging women over 25 undertake cervical screening as data shows almost 40 per cent of women in NSW are overdue for the screening which tests for HPV and ovarian cancer.
- The Australian (page 4) reports Medicines Australia has accused the government of failing to inform them of delays to PBAC assessments until October 22, despite Health Minister Mark Butler asking his department to inform MA of the delay on October 9, according to a department timeline of events.

Victorian government criticised over 'barbaric' use of firefighting foam to kill 30,000 farmed ducks
